



President's Report

Visitation and environmental education at Rancho del Oso have dramatically increased from July 2013 through June 2014. Our program offerings including hikes, tours, and walks, more than doubled and school programs quadrupled, with total attendance climbing from 38 to 242 students. Attendance at the Nature and History Center, already much higher than pre-renovation grew to 3,749 (from 2,890); and at the Ranger Station to 3,206 (from 2,557) giving us a grand total of 8,822 visitors (from 6,320)!

Those great results were due primarily to the creativity and diligence of part-time Interpretive Specialist **Morgan Dill**. Sadly for us, but happily for her—with possibly some nostalgia—Morgan has accepted a permanent position with East Bay Regional Parks. We know she'll do an outstanding job there, and hope the momentum she has established here will enable her successor, with our help, to attract even more people to experience the wonders of the Waddell Valley. —Walt Hays





Wide-eyed at Waddell

When I began at Rancho del Oso a little over two years ago, I knew there would be many things that would leave me wide-eyed. What a magnificent thing, to be able to spend time each week getting to know a place, and see the wonder in the small and the big, to slow down and appreciate all that the Waddell Valley has to offer. So often we only see a place for one moment in time, especially a park we visit, but there is always something to see out there. It brings to mind a quote from Annie Dillard's book, **Pilgrim at Tinker Creek**,

The answer must be, I think, that beauty and grace are performed whether or not we will or sense them.

The least we can do is try to be there.

And so, here are just a few of those moments that have left me wide-eyed, filled with beauty and wonder at Waddell. The early mornings where chance encounters with a bobcat were a possibility, the sound of elephant seals from atop the Westridge Trail, learning where wildflowers went from colorful bloom to seed and back again with the passing seasons, sunsets that painted the ocean in colors abundant, the bouncing song of the wrenit just outside the door, sneaking up on a resting damselfly on a log, eating plums from one of the Hoover era fruit trees, watching caddis flies crawling along rocks with the littlest visitors, popping out on the drive in to rescue lumbering California Newts from the road, singing songs by the fire, watching seeds of the coffeeberry show up in the scat of every animal in the Waddell, crunching leaves of the maple tree underfoot in the fall, fog rolling over the mountains, counting turret spider burrows on the hillside, watching a Great Blue Heron take flight from the creek, riding on trails surrounded by a carpet of redwood sorrel, the rainbow in Berry Creek Falls, and many more . . .

I hope that you continue to visit Rancho del Oso throughout the year, and discover the things that leave you wide-eyed at Waddell!


