
Salamander Saturday!

Saturday, March 7 * 12 noon to 4 pm * Nature Center

Join us for our annual celebration honoring the often overlooked, but heroically well-adapted amphibians native to the Santa Cruz Mountains and other moist habitats. Live amphibians will be on display for viewing, with all-age crafts, and activities. **Naturalist-led salamander hike** will start at 3 PM to search for these regal creatures on the Marsh Trail. Learn about salamanders and their ecosystems on this short one mile hike! For more information: (831) 427-2288.

Herpetologist Amy Patten will present her talk, Salamanders of the Santa Cruz Mountains, at 1 PM.

The diverse habitats of the Santa Cruz Mountains are home to a number of spectacular salamander species. Colorful newts, minute slender salamanders, and the impressive California Giant Salamanders are just a few of the species that you might see on a walk through the woods or even in your own backyard. Each salamander has special adaptations to meet the challenges of escaping predators, finding food, breeding and surviving harsh weather conditions. This presentation covers the natural history and behavior of these salamanders, and highlights their importance in our local ecosystems.

How did Rancho del Oso become the park it is today? Who are the plants and animals that live here? Why are they here? How did humans influence the natural history of the Waddell Valley?

Join Rancho del Oso docent **Ken Koll** (kenneth_koll@yahoo.com) for a hike on the beautiful Skyline to Sea Bypass Trail. Along the way we will pass through the varied habitats of the Waddell Valley and explore topics like natives vs. non-native, invasives, and adaptations.

The hike will begin at the Rancho del Oso Ranger Station. *Please park (free) at Waddell Beach and walk* ¹/₄ *mile past the yellow gate along the Skyline to the Sea Trail to the Ranger Station.* The hike will be approximately 4 miles. Bring water, snacks if you wish, and wear sturdy footwear. Don't forget your curiosity and inner-naturalist. It will be a great day.

Snake Park Saturdays Saturdays, February 8 * March 14 * 2 pm

Why are snakes important to us? How do they see, smell, taste, hear? What and how do they eat? What does a snake feel like? Come to the Rancho del Oso Ranger Station to learn about the fascinating world of snakes. Several snakes will be on display and native reptile adaptations will be discussed in the beautiful backdrop of Waddell Valley! Rain cancels this program. *Please park (free) at Waddell Beach and walk ¼ mile past the yellow gate along the Skyline to the Sea Trail to the Ranger Station.*



Birding for Beginners in Waddell Valley

Saturdays, February 8 * March 14 * 8 am

Interpreter **Jeremy Lin** will lead an approximate two-mile hike to observe and enjoy morning wildlife at Rancho del Oso. We will take our time and explore the beautiful coastal valley. No previous experience necessary. It is helpful to bring binoculars, bird guides and a readiness for patient observation as we witness wildlife awakening on a crisp Waddell Valley morning. A new **Welcome Center** is needed at Rancho del Oso on the most popular hike in Santa Cruz County, the Skyline to Sea trail. The Center will serve as an orientation point for hikers and other park visitors, and provide room for environmental education. The new Welcome Center would expand the original Visitor Center footprint 144 ft with a 336 ft attached outdoor classroom. We only need to raise \$50,000 to match State Park's matching grant. Will you help us with this once in a lifetime opportunity?

The existing building installed used in 1976 is in critical need of replacement. Increasing capacity would benefit: education, enjoyment, and connection between the ancient redwoods of Big Basin State Park and this world-class kite-surfing site. Our environmental educational program serves over 736 students a year, increased space would greatly increase our capacity.

Growing up at Rancho del Oso convinced Hulda Hoover McLean of the importance of this, "We always felt that owning a place like Rancho del Oso was more a stewardship than a possession. There is a responsibility to cherish and nurture its natural inhabitants, maintain its beauty and protect its ecosystem." Ultimately, this viewpoint helps us move beyond our local environment to embrace an all-encompass planetary stewardship crucial to protecting all life.
